Transitions

Mark Blatter

In January, Mark Blatter, our Director of Real Estate, left Historic Seattle to take on the position of Executive Director for the Housing Resources Board on Bainbridge Island. That organization has a track record for building and managing affordable housing in Kitsap County. For ten years, Mark was instrumental in moving Historic Seattle ahead on the purchase and rehabilitation of the Cadillac Hotel and Washington Hall and completion of the Chapel space at Good Shepherd Center. He also investigated leads for other potential development projects for the organization.

Prior to his work at Historic Seattle, he served as Executive Director of the St. Andrew's Housing Group, a nonprofit that developed affordable housing in east King County. With this new position, Mark is returning to a field he strongly believes in—affordable housing.

Kji Kelly will expand his responsibilities and will not only continue his property and asset management of Historic Seattle's real estate portfolio but as the new Director of Real Estate will lead the organization's continuing development of Washington Hall and will be the point person for historic real estate opportunities and projects.

Nancy has a Masters in Public Administration from Seattle University. She is an articulate, intelligent, and thoughtful first contact for people calling the organization and an essential link to our smoothly tackling the work of various staff members.

Matt will take over the responsibilities of long time Historic Seattle employee Mark Willson who recently moved with his family to Colorado. Matt's professional dedication and varied skill-set will continue to prove extremely valuable as Historic Seattle eagerly moves into its 37th year of stewardship of the property.

Grant Awards

Historic Seattle was successful in its recent requests for funding from 4Culture and the City of Seattle Office of Arts & Cultural Affairs (OACA). We have been awarded \$40,000 for new exterior doors and interior finish work at Washington Hall through 4Culture's 2011 Arts Cultural Facilities Fund and \$1,990 for our 2012 Design Arts Lectures through the Civic Partners Fund of OACA. We are grateful to 4Culture and the City of Seattle for their continued support of our projects.

At Our Properties Update: Heg/Phillips Chimney Restoration Completed

Three contractors were invited to provide proposals to repair and restore both chimneys on the west elevation of the Heg / Phillips Apartments located at 711 – 713 East Union. Scope of work included: the replacement of deteriorated and spalled brick; re-pointing mortar joints; removal of moss; confirmation of structural integrity of chimney strapping and tie-backs; repair and patch of chimney tops; and application of two coats of masonry waterproofing. The project was awarded to Cantrell Restoration from Lake Stevens, Washington. In order to match new materials to the existing, a brick and mortar submittal was reviewed and approved prior to the pre-construction meeting. This exterior masonry work comes shortly after a comprehensive lead paint stabilization project was completed in the prior year.

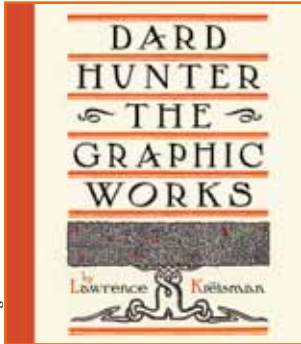

Lovers of the Arts and Crafts have long been drawn to Roycroft books by the remarkable graphic imagery and experimental typefaces designed by Dard Hunter, who excelled as a designer, craftsman,

printer, typographer, and papermaker. A new book by Historic Seattle Program Director Lawrence Kreisman explains how a youth growing up in rural Ohio tapped into progressive European design ideas, made them his own, and succeeded in giving these designs national exposure. Dard Hunter sought to explore new and different ideas overseas rather than simply follow in the footsteps of the accepted theories at home. He adapted avant-garde German and Austrian Secession concepts into a graphic design vocabulary that was made available to the mainstream. The presentation showcases Hunter's growth as a graphic artist and reveals the beauty, variety, and character-defining forms and typography that distinguish his work from others.

Lawrence Kreisman, an educator and author in the field of architectural history and preservation, is Program Director of Historic Seattle. He is author of *Apartments by Anhalt*, *Art Deco Seattle*, *West Queen Anne School: Renaissance of a Landmark*, *Historic Preservation in Seattle*, *The Bloedel Reserve: Gardens in the Forest*, *The Stimson Legacy: Architecture in the Urban West*, *Made to Last: Historic Preservation in Seattle and King County*, and co-author of *The Arts and Crafts Movement in the Pacific Northwest*.

Most Seattleites have gone to movies at the Harvard Exit Theatre. Some come early to enjoy a drink and conversation in the cozy parlor, which owes its 1920s ambience to the Woman's Century Club, a 120-year-old social club for women whose past members included Bertha Landes, the first woman mayor of Seattle; painter E. Inez Denny; and Judge Evangeline Starr. New members include Historic Seattle members Sherri Schultz and Paula Becker, who have delved through the vaults to show off some of its treasures.

Founded in Seattle in 1891 by a group of forward-thinking women led by suffragist Carrie Chapman Catt, the club produced yearly Arts and Crafts exhibitions from 1904 through 1909. In the 1920s the women raised the funds to build their own clubhouse—the three-story Neoclassical red-brick building that today houses one of Seattle's best-loved movie theaters. In the late 1960s the building was sold, but the club retained the lifelong right to meet in the parlor, which it does to this day, presenting programs designed to connect and inspire women in the 21st century. Preservation Advocacy in South Lake Union: The Boren Investment Company Warehouse



The architectural heritage of the Cascade neighborhood and South Lake Union area is an eclectic one. Its existing warehouses remind us of the area's light industrial history and they continue to define the streetscapes as the neighborhood's physical fabric changes dramatically. The Boren Investment Company Warehouse (334 Boren Ave N.) remains significant to the community. Last fall, Historic Seattle and the Washington Trust for Historic Preservation worked closely with South Lake Union and Cascade neighborhood preservation advocates to support the nomination and designation of the Boren Investment Company Warehouse (aka David Smith Furniture Building).

The building was threatened by planned new development on the entire city block which includes the designated landmark Troy Laundry Building (311-329 Fairview Ave N.). *The Seattle Times* sold the block to Touchstone Corporation which plans to redevelop the site. Previous preferred alternatives presented to the Architectural Review Committee of the Landmarks Preservation Board (LPB) showed little more than the primary façades of one or both buildings being retained. With the successful designation of the Boren Investment Company Warehouse by the LPB in November 2011, revised plans were presented by the developer, showing a design that incorporates the two landmarks in a more compatible manner. Historic Seattle continues to monitor progress of the proposed plans. At its annual Volunteers Recognition Party in January 2012, Historic Seattle thanked neighborhood advocates Christine Lea and Colleen Dooley for their efforts in helping to save the Boren Investment Company Warehouse.

Western Building Update

Stabilization by WSDOT of the Western Building in Pioneer Square is scheduled to begin this spring. This work will minimize potential damage to the building while the tunneling work is in process beneath it. WSDOT will return the partially retrofitted structure to the property owner after the tunneling crew passes the area. To prepare for the full rehabilitation of the building, the property owner's project team has been working closely with WSDOT and the City of Seattle. The project's architect is in the process of seeking approvals from the Pioneer Square Preservation Board for the renovation.

Historic Theatres Library Opens

On Thursday, March 1, the Seattle Theatre Group Historic Theatres Library officially opened to the public coinciding with the anniversary of the opening of Seattle's Paramount Theatre on March 1, 1928—84 years ago. The library is located in the Paramount Theatre's Office Tower adjacent to the theatre.

The Seattle Theatre Group envisioned a historic theatre library for the Paramount, Moore, and Neptune Theatres. It required the gathering, sorting, documenting, cataloging, and preserving of over 100 years of historical data. Nearly 4,000 volunteer hours were required to complete this project.

This valuable resource contains binders on a variety of topics: performers that graced the stages over the many decades; a journey through the peaks and valleys that these theatres had to endure; wall hangings depicting the many challenges along the way; the visionaries responsible for these theatres; priceless memorabilia; and signed posters. Also included in the library are converted CD/DVDs of performers and events, along with Seattle's Paramount Theatre opening night silent movie DVD, *Feel My Pulse*.

The library is open to the public on Tuesday and Thursday each week from 10 am – 3 pm. Admission is free. For more information, please contact Marian Thrasher at library@stgprepresents.org.

Presentations at the Fair

Timeless Style, Modern Living, 11 am

Carol Sundstrom, AIA, röm architecture studio

Your kitchen is the hardest-working room in your home and upgrading it comes with a long list of decisions. Learn how to make choices that will work for your family today—and for decades to come—while preserving, enhancing, or restoring your home's historic style. Learn how to incorporate elements that allow for aging-in-place, the basics for cabinet and countertop choices, and how those choices influence price. Question and answer session follows.

Architect Carol Sundstrom is the owner of röm architecture studio. With over 15 years of experience, Carol's projects have been published in many books and magazines and she is the recipient of the 2011 AIA/HUD Alan J. Rothman Housing Accessibility Award.

Masonry Restoration, 12 pm

Learn about the function of masonry restoration and what to look for on your building to see if restoration is necessary. The difference between old masonry and new masonry will be discussed and what materials are appropriate for historic homes and buildings. It's a given that historic older homes are vulnerable to earthquakes and we are guaranteed to experience earthquakes in Seattle sometime in the future. This presentation covers the ABCs of securing your home:

anchoring the house to the foundation; bracing the pony walls; and connecting the flooring system. It also covers plans available for structural work, including: the Standard Earthquake Retrofit Plan of the City of Seattle; permitting retrofit work; and Earthquake Retrofit Training Classes for homeowners. Question and answer session follows.

Bruce Schoonmaker organized A-FFIX LLC & Earthquake Prepared.com in 1999 in response to the great need to secure homes and buildings in the Puget Sound region. The company has retrofitted over 400 homes and buildings.

Interior Storm Windows for Old Buildings, 2 pm

Laser Scanning as a Tool for Historic Preservation, 3 pm

Clients enjoy a number of practical benefits—more detail, fewer delays, greater safety, better visualization, greater access, less downtime, and more.

Brad Freeman is a Principal of Triad Associates with 39 years of experience in surveying, mapping and project management. He is actively involved in Triad's 3D laser scanning projects putting this high-tech tool to work on historic preservation projects.

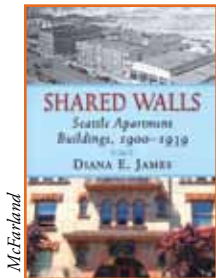

Diana James. *Shared Walls: Seattle Apartment Buildings, 1900 – 1939* (McFarland, 2012, \$55)

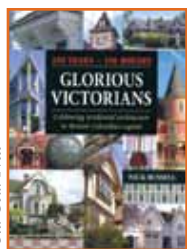
Ron Tanner. *From Animal House to Our House* (Academy Chicago, 2012, \$24.95)

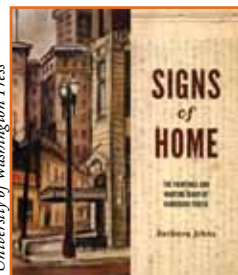

Barbara Johns. *Signs of Home: The Paintings and Wartime Diary of Kamekichi Tokita* (University of Washington Press, 2011, \$50)

This book makes visible the exceptional paintings by Kamekichi Tokita (a Seattle Asian Art Museum exhibit of his work and that of his friend and fellow sign painter Kenjiro Nomura recently closed). It captures vignettes of streets and alleys in Pioneer Square and the International District that he painted prior to the family's internment during World War II. Of particular interest to Historic Seattle members is that he and his wife operated the Cadillac Hotel when it provided single room occupancy housing for local workers during the Depression.
